Starting with the Winter, 2014 issue, MFanfare will be emailed electronically and posted to our website for members to see whenever you would like.

Actually, you can already view *MFanfare* on our website. All but the most recent edition of MFanfare are on www.umbaa.org under Members/MFanfare. The current MFanfare is available on the Members/Member Only page for those who are logged in to the site. We are going electronic for several reasons:

- To save the trees! According to Conservatree, one tree makes 8,333 sheets of typical 20 lb. weight copy paper. Mailing out MFanfare kills a bunch of trees.

DUDE! WHERE'S MY FORM?

In 2013, UMBAA members will **REGISTER ONLINE AT WWW.UMBAA.ORG** to pay dues and register for Homecoming, so we didn't include a paper form in this Blast Issue of *MFanfare*. Going electronic makes the management of events and members 100% more efficient, which is very important in a 100% volunteer organization.

To pay dues and/or register for Homecoming, login to UMBAA.ORG and select HOMECOMING & DUES from the Forms menu. In order to participate in the 2013 Blast, you must pay annual dues (unless you've already paid lifetime dues) AND the Blast participation fee. REVELLI HALL IS 40— AND HOW IT REALLY HAPPENED

n the beginning, there was no band hall, and a void existed at Hoover and Division, and George said, "Let us erect a magnificent building—not as good as, but better than." And lo, the building came into being. And it was good—better than.

That is a bit of a stretch, but the actual facts about the first year of Revelli Hall forty years ago can be interesting, even entertaining – at least to me, since I was there helping to create history. To understand it all, some background information is in order.

The Michigan Bands, having used various facilities over the years, settled into Harris Hall at the corner of State and Huron just after World War II. The building, on lease to the university, had a large upstairs room with tremendous acoustics, which served as the rehearsal hall. Off to the side was a much smaller instrument storage room. The first floor had rooms which served as offices for Revelli, his assistant, and teaching studios for some of the wind faculty. Another three rooms in the basement served as storage rooms for uniforms. Walls throughout were decorated with framed band pictures.

The rest of the School of Music was scattered in various buildings around central campus. This was consolidated with the construction of the Moore building on North Campus which opened in January 1964. All wind faculty moved their offices there, but as it had only one rehearsal hall which was used by the

Symphony Band, two orchestras, and a number of conducting classes, Harris Hall was still needed for the rest of the band program.

In the era of the later '60s, university classes began on the Friday after Labor Day. Marching Band members would report for a Sunday afternoon meeting and auditions would be held on the morning of Labor Day, with a first playing rehearsal that afternoon. Full days of rehearsals - playing in Harris Hall and marching on Wines Field (as Elbel Field was called in those days) – were held on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. With the start of classes on Friday, rehearsals switched to 4:20 daily at Wines Field. Playing rehearsals were then conducted in the small building at the corner of Division and Hill (now referred to as the boxing building). Harris Hall was then used by the Marching Band library staff for weekly music preparation, and for rehearsals by the Concert and Varsity Bands.

(For more recent band members to whom that schedule seems rather short – realize that at that time the NCAA did not allow schools to schedule more than ten games, and there were no "bye" weeks. When Bo Schembechler arrived in 1969, we didn't have to play for a game until September 20 – and that was Band Day! So we actually had four weeks to prepare for our first half-time show. Of course, in typical Revelli fashion, we didn't start rehearsing that show until September 22 ... but I digress -)

So, the situation was that the major storage facility for the Marching Band was at Harris Hall, far from the practice field. Also, there was

not an adequate playing rehearsal facility near the field. On top of that, the university lease on Harris Hall was due to expire. Obviously another facility was needed. Around 1970, Ernest Jones, a successful advertising executive who had been Revelli's first student business manager, pledged \$100,000 toward the construction of a new building. At the time of Revelli's retirement in 1971, nothing more definite regarding a new building was being announced.

George Cavender was named Director of Bands in December, 1971, and continued doing that job as Revelli had - conducting both the Marching and Symphony Bands. He came into a Symphony Band rehearsal in February of 1972 very excited. He had been in a meeting with members of the Kresge Foundation that morning, and had convinced them to commit \$300,000 toward a new building whose cost was estimated at a half million dollars. Combined with the original pledge, and anticipated sufficient contributions from alumni and friends to make up the difference, the funds were now available to proceed with plans.


One of my earlier memories of the planning stage was John Larkin, Assistant Director of Bands, being told to measure every room in Harris Hall for a report to the Kresge Foundation. They had apparently made it clear to Cavender that their intent was to provide a replacement for current facilities and not to create some extravagant "palace". This attitude would have major ramifications down the road.

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the building were held in November of 1972. As with any groundbreaking, many people, representing the university, School of Music, donors, et. al., were called upon to toss a shovelful of dirt. To represent the students of the band, the

assignment was given to the presidents of Nu chapter, Kappa Kappa Psi, and

Lambda chapter, Tau Beta Sigma, who were myself and Jan Holland, respectively.

Besides being president of Nu from 1972-74, I was also equipment manager for the summers of 1972 and 1973, and student business manager for all bands in 1973-74. As such, I had access (keys) to everything belonging to the band in Harris Hall and the School of Music. When the Symphony Band returned from its tour of the Midwest in mid-

May, the exterior of the new building was complete, but much work was still needed inside. The plan was to use the building that fall, but there was no word on when we could start moving in. Anticipating that the move would be a major undertaking and realizing that things were not ready for a move, I organized $KK\Psi$ -TB Σ workdays every couple of

LOOKING BACK ON FIFTY YEARS

Fifty years have passed since the fall of 1963, my freshman year in the U-M School of Music and my first year in the Michigan Marching Band. As I began to write this remembrance, I wondered if I had my facts straight or if, over the years, I had embellished memories of that fall. After sorting through a box of papers in the basement and spending some time in the Bentley Historical Library on North Campus with George Cavender's "Blue Book" for 1963. I was pleased to find that events had happened very close to the way I had remembered.

According to the "First Week's Schedule," the entire band registered for classes on Wednesday, August 28, the same day as brass and percussion auditions at 1:30 pm and the Mass Meeting at 7:30 pm in the Union Ballroom. Thursday, August 29, the Woodwinds auditioned in Harris Hall at 9:00 am. I was pleased to be placed 7th chair out of 13 Alto Saxophones, high enough to play 1st alto parts. The Alto Saxophones were the first ones on the field that vear and I was on the south 40 at the bottom of the Block M. George Cavender seems to have rethought the instrument placement on the field after that.

pm. the new men (no women in Marching Band at his time) met for our first drill, held on Wines field, renamed Elbel Field during the Cavender years. We marched facing west toward the railroad tracks. the same direction that we would face when in the stadium. The field was not nice grass, asphalt or Astroturf, but basically just mowed weeds which very quickly progressed to dirt, dust, mud and finally frozen ruts later in the season.

Friday and Saturday of the first week consisted of full band at Harris Hall from 9:00-11:45 am and 1:30-3:00 pm, followed by full band drill at Wines from 3:30-5:30 pm. From then on, all 183 band members crowded into the flat-roofed brick building "The Boxing Building," on the southwest corner of Hill and Division for warm-ups and music rehearsals.

Even as a freshman I felt very comfortable in Ann Arbor. I

had been privileged to be part of a smaller band chosen from the All-State Band at Interlochen in the summers of 1961 and 1962. We came to Ann Arbor for several days to work with Dr. Revelli, George Cavender and other quest conductors as a demonstration band for a summer band directors' conference. We were housed in South Quad, rehearsed most of the day, and worked in sectionals. The Saxophones, of course, worked with Professor Larry Teal and his then student. Donald Sinta, who one evening played a short recital for the conference. Then I knew what a Saxophone was supposed to sound like.

On Thursday evening, we joined the Summer Session Band for a concert near the Diag behind Angell Hall; one of the selections on the program was Jerry Bilik's "American Civil War Fantasy." In other words, I knew what I was getting into and was

anticipating and relishing the experiences ahead.

The football team was fairly lack-luster, ranked seventh in the Big Ten, an overall record of 3-4-2, and a weekly at-home average attendance of 57, 234. However, with so many empty seats in the stadium, we were still able to host the annual Band Day, Saturday, September 28. I felt like

such a Big-Man-On-Campus, meeting the bus from Coldwater, Michigan, and escorting my former high school band from the golf course to the stadium.

My sister was a twirler with the Coldwater Band and this would be the first time my parents would see me march with the Michigan Band because this was not only our first home game, it was also the first game of the season.

In 1963, there were no special "firsts" planned as some bands boast. Except for myself, and I imagine for most of the 76 MMB Freshmen, everything was a "first" – the knee lift, the stride, the physical endurance, the big sound – all while rehearsing with 180 "Michigan Men" striving toward the perfection and pride of the already storied program of which we were now a part.

Finally then, there is that "first" which has always been and remains for me an fresh and intense emotional experience no matter how many times it is

repeated – the entrance through the tunnel.

In the "Michigan Band Herald," August 1, 1963, really just a letter that welcomed the members back to school, it stated that the band would be traveling to the Minnesota game as guests of the Chevrolet Division of General Motors and that "naturally everything will be first class." We were to travel by a private chartered train which "features food and scenery second to none."

The team lost the "Little Brown Jug" 6-0, but it was still a great trip. I was especially impressed by the linen table cloths and silver flatware and serving dishes in the dining car. No coincidence that at the Mass meeting in August, we had been given song sheets of traditional Michigan songs; the last song on the sheet was "See the USA in your Chevrolet."

Our year changed suddenly on Friday, November 22, 1963. It was a rainy, overcast, grey fall day, the kind that Ann Arbor does so well. I had attended my 1:00 pm violin class with Elizabeth A. H. Green in the southeast corner room on the second floor of Lane Hall. While we were practicing the piece for our first semester Violin exam, President John F. Kennedy was assassinated at

12:30 pm, CST. While walking back to South Quad I gradually became aware that JFK had been assassinated. The men of South Quad's Taylor House crowded into our House Mother's room (yes, House Mother) to stare at the black and white T.V. in disbelief.

We reported to that afternoon's band rehearsal to put the final

touches on our show for Saturday's OSU game. This was, of course, a time before 24-hour headline instant news channels. No one knew much about what was happening except for watching Walter Cronkite's historic and emotional announcement of President Kennedy's death. Later that afternoon, Lyndon B. Johnson was sworn in as the 36th President with Jackie

Kennedy standing by in her blood-soaked dress.

Dr. Revelli had apparently done some quick homework and told us briefly about Lyndon Johnson, probably trying to convince himself as well as to reassure us that transition of power set in the Constitution was actually going to work.

The next morning, we reported for rehearsal and were told that the game had been postponed, even though the Ohio State team and band were already in Ann Arbor. The game had been rescheduled for the following Saturday, November 30, at the end of Thanksgiving vacation. Note: It was to be another 38 years before the next Michigan football game would be rescheduled -September 11, 2001. It was two weeks later that the Michigan and Western Michigan Bands presented an emotional, stirring and memorable joining of forces in tribute to America.

Many band members returned to Ann Arbor the day after Thanksgiving to rehearse for the game the next day. (The Ohio State Band did not return that second week-end). The marching block was reduced for the game from 13 ranks of 12, to 13 ranks of 9. We all had a new spot to learn, even

though we were to present the same shows as had been planned earlier. However, there is a copy of George Cavender's

original continuity sheet for pre-game on which he wrote in red pencil "not used." Instead, after the National Anthem, he inserted a moving arrangement of "Taps" followed by "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" in "tribute to President Kennedy."

Saturday, November 30, 1963, was grey and cold, fitting the mood of the country still in shock and mourning. We wore the long dark- blue Napoleon style overcoats with the cape wrapped around to the front. They always seemed to weigh at least 40 pounds and this particular day they felt even heavier.

In juxtaposition to the mood of the day, we played *Temptation*,

pictures taken for the front of Christmas cards.)

Our 1963 band's "first" is probably not appropriate to celebrate on a T- shirt.
Certainly a more uplifting season was to follow in the fall of 1964 with the opening and dedication of the School of Music building on North Campus, the Rose Bowl, East-West Shrine Game, and the very first Band-O-Rama. But that's a story for next fall.

Ironically, this fall, 50 years later, the calendar repeats itself: November 22 again falls on a Friday, and on Saturday, November 30, Michigan will host Ohio State.

weeks through the summer. A major part of that effort involved taking down the band pictures and the Edwin Franko Goldman picture collection and cataloguing them as we packed them in boxes to be moved. *Note: See inset.*

Yet, with all of our efforts, we still had no idea what was happening with the band hall. GRC had been working throughout July to hire a new assistant director, and finally came to terms with Jim Keene at the end of the month on the day of the Summer Band concert. The following day, George left for several weeks for some clinic (in Japan, I believe); on Saturday, August 4, I left for the national convention of KKΨ-TBΣ; and on Monday the 6th, Keene arrived with no one in Ann Arbor to tell him what was going on! When I arrived back in Ann Arbor the following Sunday, we had three weeks left until the first meeting, George was still not due back until the end of the week, and we still couldn't move into the hall!

Finally, on Thursday, August 23, in midafternoon, George came into my office in the School of Music and said, "Get some workers lined up. We're moving on Saturday." That would allow us eight days to prepare the building. I spent a long evening trying to call every member of Nu and Lambda who might be within driving distance of Ann Arbor (this was the pre-internet days of no computers, email, or cell phones!). Friday afternoon, George and I did a walk-through of Harris Hall identifying and prioritizing

MOVING THE BANDS

BY JOSEPH MCMULLEN '72

In the summer of 1973, I was one of several members of Nu Kappa Kappa Psi who volunteered to pack up photos, props, and miscellaneous stuff from Harris Hall, the band's old rehearsal building, and get them to the brand new Revelli Hall. We stacked all these items randomly into a storage room at the new band hall, and over the next year, I tried to catalog the old photos, movies, and vinyl band albums that had been collecting dust for years at Harris Hall.

Before the 1973 band season started at Revelli Hall that fall, George Cavender came up with lots of additional tasks for the student volunteers. For example, a few of us spray painted 300 or so music stands in the parking lot.

During that first year in the new band hall, I was a contributing writer for the *Leaky Bugle*, and in subsequent years I was the editor. The staff of the Bugle would spend hours each week typing the content (and drawing cartoons) on the old mimeograph carbon paper stencils. We would then pass this over to James Keene, the assistant conductor, who would interrupt his own work designing the band formation charts to print the Leaky Bugle copies for us on the incredibly old AB Dick mimeograph machine. NOTE: There were NO computers or desktop publishing software available to us in 1973!

what had to be moved. The plan was that the university would provide two trucks. One would make trips to Harris Hall, where I was to supervise the loading, while the other would go to the

School of Music where Keene would do the same. Cavender was at the hall directing the unloading. Once unloaded, the trucks returned for more.

Nothing had been moved and we were already facing our first problem of space. The large equipment and library storage rooms connected to the rehearsal room at the School of Music contained all of the bands' non-marching instruments and concert music. probably in The dean had decided that since the new building was now to be the headquarters of the university bands (Cavender's office and secretary would be located there), everything belonging to the bands would be assigned there. This had not been the intent in designing the new hall, which was only supposed to replace Harris Hall. I was working in the equipment room in June and listened as George front lounge unsuccessfully pleaded his case to the dean. His arguments fell on deaf ears, and thus we had two trucks moving more than the building was intended to contain.

By the end of Saturday, we had piles of things, mostly on the rehearsal room floor, to put away, and one week to accomplish the task, which would require a week of workdays running from about 7 a.m. to midnight. Cavender,

Keene, and I were there the whole time, as well as Dana Wiegand, '69, band librarian. The job couldn't have been completed without the efforts of the west side of the building. all of our fraternity and sorority members who came as often and as long as they could. I hesitate to mention names, for fear that I might leave someone out. Suffice it to sav that it wouldn't have happened

without them.

A brief explanation is order for those whose experience at Revelli Hall came after the addition of the Shepherd Wing. The original building included the rehearsal hall, front lobby, and east side

locker hall, pretty much as it is today. The rehearsal room had three doors opening into three storage areas. The back one was the equipment room. Its door would have been about where the back hallway is now. Its back wall went only as far back as the wall on the other rooms (I think those still have their original walls). The reception area consisted of two library file cabinets along the small offices facing Hoover

Street, a receptionist area which would now be in the recording room, and a slightly larger office for the director on The Shepherd Wing addition includes the whole new office area and meeting room and the west hall and adjacent rooms, plus a large portion of the re-modeled equipment room.

The point is, there was much (a lot!) less space in 1973 than needed. We put together steel shelving for percussion and just set it out in the rehearsal room, as there was no place else for it. Sousaphone racks were left out in the main room. The library wouldn't fit in the back room as intended. The first storage room had more

walls, with uniform racks on the floor in front. The middle storage room was designated as my business office, and also housed any unhung pictures. and anything else that had no place else to go.

We weren't going to have new furniture for opening day, so desks and chairs had also been moved from the other buildings. To improve at least some appearances, we went out and rented a power spray-painter to give all the music stands, which were in various stages of fading,

a fresh black coat (I also suspect that some of those stands had something other than "University Bands" stenciled on them before we sprayed them!).

Sunday, September 2 arrived, along with the largest turnout ever for the Michigan

Marching Band – 235 members, about twenty more than the previous high. Besides the issue of not enough uniforms (flags that year wore yellow windbreakers rather than the standard uniform. It would be another three years before new uniforms would be acquired for the whole band.), there were still Hall on the afternoon of more space issues. The women's rest room was intended only for visitors - the plans for

the building, which assumed that the exact date, but I do know a changing area for women was not needed, had been prepared prior to the passage of Title IX, and then were never changed, even though women had been in rehearsal of the Michigan Youth the marching band for two months before the groundbreaking. This situation continued for over fifteen years until the addition of the Shepherd Wing.

In retrospect, the minor shortcomings didn't faze us this was our building, and we were excited and proud of it, because we were so involved in its preparation in a way that no

other building on campus could lay claim. So we set about to create the beginnings of new traditions.

It can't be considered a new tradition, but as first chair clarinet, I had the honor of giving the first tuning note in Revelli September 3, after a busy morning of the first auditions in the building. I'm not certain of

that sometime in that week we had the first delivery of a Domino's pizza to Revelli Hall. On a more serious note, the first Band, under the direction of Harry McTerry, took place on Saturday afternoon, September 8, 1973, in the Revelli Hall rehearsal room, starting another tradition of the School of Music.

With my dual capacity as student business manager and president of Nu, we considered it almost like the frat house we didn't have. Since I could enter and lockup any time I wanted, we

could work on projects at ኛ any time. As I was also editor and chief writer of the Leaky Bugle, we would spend late Thursday nights every week putting together ten page issues to distribute the next day. I also recall one very long session where we were processing BandORama ticket orders and counting the money. We had no

calculators - it took many efforts doing the math by hand to come up with the same answer twice in a row! The Michigan State game that year was played in a torrential downpour in East Lansing - sitting on the sidelines we watched waves pouring across the crest of the Tartan Turf. With the ink on the music running, we cleared the floor of



the rehearsal hall upon our return and immediately starting unstuffing folders and laying out pieces of music all across the room, trying to rescue as many as possible. In spite of many long sessions, we never pulled an "all-nighter" until we got to Homecoming.

The formal dedication of the hall was scheduled for the morning of Homecoming, October 20, 1973. From the beginning of September, Cavender had been insisting that the building was not going to be known as Revelli Hall, but rather as "The University of Michigan Bands Building." He had no say in it - on Monday the 15th, a university crew came and planted a blue Revelli Hall sign in front. As the week went along, George kept insisting to me that everyone would have to clear out at 6:00 p.m. on Friday so a crew could come in and wax the floor. I kept insisting that there were too many things that had to be done, and we would just stay out of their way while we made preparations. I had a concern that I was determined to address. The large picture of Revelli in his marching director uniform, holding his baton, was still hanging in Harris Hall. The picture had originally been created, through the efforts of

Joe Dobos, for Revelli's retirement banquet and had hung in Harris Hall since the fall of 1971. During our walkthrough in August, Cavender had specifically told me to leave it there and had made no further mention of it. On the evening before Homecoming, he left at about 6:00. Keene

was working in his office until about 10:00. As he walked out the door, I turned to Bob Gray, who had a convertible, and said, "Get your car. We've got to get the Old Man out of Harris Hall." And we did, since I still had keys for Harris Hall. It was quite a sight, driving through town in an open convertible with a large picture of Revelli in the back seat. towering over us, as if he were directing our moves! Back in the hall, we had a couple of stools and a piece of Formica counter that had never been installed from a sink in the storage room. We covered those with a piece of blue felt and set the picture on top, leaning it against the east wall of the lounge. To ensure that no one would arrive before us in the morning, some of us pulled the first "all-nighter" in the hall. Around 7:15 a.m.. Cavender arrived with a few alumni right behind him. All he

could say was, "Wow, what a picture." It has never left the hall since.

The season finale against Ohio State that year was on November 24. I had realized during the summer that the date of the UM-Chicago game which inspired "The Victors" took place on November 24, 1898, which meant the OSU game was going to be exactly the 75th anniversary of "The Victors". Of course, that meant we had to close with some "Salute to the Victors" show. The display case that week contained Louis Elbel's handwritten story of "The Victors". Knowing that most people couldn't take the time to read it from there. I decided to include it in the final Leaky Bugle. Thursday was Thanksgiving, and I couldn't go home, so I spent that evening with my typewriter set up in

front of the display case, just enough light to be able to read, transcribing the text for my last Leaky Bugle for my last game in the building that almost seemed to belong to me in my last year with the band.

True Michigan football buffs know that game was the 10-10 tie that resulted in the infamous decision to keep us out of the Rose Bowl. With the season over (this was still the era of Rose Bowl-or-nothing for Big Ten teams), uniform turn-in was scheduled for Sunday. December 16. Earlier in that week, Cavender suggested that Kappa Kappa Psi might want to decorate the hall with a small tree. When I mentioned it at a meeting a few days later, Tim Schumaier '72. who was from Saline, asked, "How big?" Saturday evening, after dark, several cars followed him to somewhere south of Saline. We parked by a wooded area. Several climbed a fence, went off and came back with what appeared to be a rather large tree. It was tied to the top of a not-too-large car, which we drove very carefully through downtown Saline. Returning to Revelli Hall, we brought it in through the back door and discovered that it was indeed big. Standing it up in the northwest corner of the rehearsal hall, we managed to

poke one of the ceiling tiles out of place – it was too big! We did cut it down a bit to fit the room and decorated it with anything we could find (spats, gloves, epaulets, to name a few!). It was quite a hit the next day at uniform turn-in.

1973 was also a significant one for the Hockey Band. In the '60's, Cavender would occasionally provide a pep band at hockey games, recruiting people from the Varsity Band on a per-game basis, but there was no regular Hockey Band. In

Revelli's last two years, there were no bands at hockey games. In the fall of 1971, some Kappa Kappa Psi seniors, who had played at some games in their freshman year, expressed interest in starting a band as a fraternity project. When I approached Cavender with the idea, he readily agreed, indicating that the athletic department had been asking about the possibility. What I didn't realize was that he

assumed I would conduct it. I was told one Monday to have a band at the game on Friday, and suddenly I was in charge of the first formal Hockey Band! In 1971, games were still played in the Coliseum on the north side of Hill Street. We would only play at one game per weekend, as I was recruiting members of the Basketball Band, and the schedule would have been too much for them to play at three games in a weekend. This arrangement continued through the 1972-73 season also.

Several things changed with the 1973-74 season. The games were moved to Yost Field House (which had been flooded to become the Yost Ice Arena), which was very convenient to Revelli Hall. By this time, I had developed a core of musicians, many of whom were not in the Basketball Band. So for the first time, the Hockey Band played at all home games, and we were actually issued tickets to the games (somehow at the Coliseum we were just able to wander in). We did miss one National Anthem. Michigan wrestler Rick Bay had approached me about the possibility of a band at a wrestling meet, which was the same night as a hockey game. I agreed to spend some time at each. I wasn't certain about the band's reaction, so I didn't tell them in advance. When they

showed up at Revelli Hall that night, I didn't give them their hockey tickets, but told them to follow me over to Crisler Arena. The first (and possibly only?) Michigan Wrestling Band played the National Anthem and then tried to settle into a routine of playing "The Victors" if we won a match and "Varsity" if we lost. We discovered that little time was wasted – we couldn't play through one trio before the next match started. After sitting through a few matches, we returned to Yost where we received a standing ovation from the crowd who had come to consider us an important part of the game (apparently there had been a lack of communication, and they didn't realize we wouldn't be there at the start, resulting in a scramble to find a recording of the Star Spangled Banner!).

There's one other sidelight that resulted in a major tradition. In that first season at Yost, I had a freshman tuba player by the name of Joe Carl. He came to me at the first hockey game and asked if it would be okay to play some tuba cheers to pump up the crowd, as during the game we couldn't do much more than play "The Victors" when we scored. I didn't think that would upset the game too much and told him to go ahead. He was constantly experimenting — I never knew what he would come up with next. Some things worked; some didn't. In the course of experimenting, he eventually would create the cheer which has since been named "Let's Go Blue."

In April, the district convention of Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma was held in a mountain lodge near Oxford, Ohio. Chapter displays were always an option at the conventions. That year we had something to show off. A scale model, about two and a half feet square, of Revelli Hall was constructed. A tour guide tape was made, walking the listener through the building and describing the different







rooms. Between spoken tours, we had it playing *The Victors*. We cranked the tape so it could be heard all over the lodge. We were loud and obnoxious, but we were proud. And I suspect there are forty years of stories and pride out there still to be told. Revelli Hall belongs to the University of Michigan, but even more, it belongs to the members of the band who will leave it with their own special memories. *And it is good — better than*.




